From Pastor Robert ...

What music do you think of when you think of Advent? Some pastors and churches are very traditional, and they defer the singing of all Christmas carols until Christmas Eve. It's hard to do this in our culture, when Christmas melodies start drifting through the stores shortly after Halloween!

During December, even as we focus on the important themes of Advent, we'll also enjoy some of the favorite Christmas music of the season. But we'll also use Advent songs - both those that are familiar and some that aren't so familiar. (You hardly ever hear an Advent hymn in Target or Walmart.)

Some of the lesser-known Advent hymns have amazingly wonderful messages for us. Flip through the hymnal some time and take a look at the words from 196 through 214.

The song "Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates" (UMH 213) has a stanza which invites us to "fling wide the portals of your heart," to "make it a temple set apart from earthly use for heaven's employ, adorned with prayer and love and joy."

The song "Hail To the Lord's Anointed" (UMH 203) is one that reminds us how Jesus' coming has earth-shattering power to change everything: "He comes to break oppression, to set the captive free; to take away transgression, and rule in equity."

I encourage you NOT to devote only one hour on Sunday to the themes of Advent. Let the Scriptures and devotionals and music of the Advent season be a blessing to you each day between now and Christmas Eve!

Chrismon ornaments were first developed by Frances Kipps Spencer at Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia. In 1957, Mrs. Spencer began thinking about a way to decorate the Christmas tree in her church that would be more suitable for a Sanctuary. She thought that the traditional bright ornaments were not appropriate for a worship setting and began looking for something that would reflect the Christian faith.





Thinking of the tradition of decorating

a birthday cake with the honoree's name, Mrs. Spencer decided to place the name of Jesus and his title, Christ, on the tree. Rather than using English, however, she used the Greek monograms. Thus the Greek "Chi Rho" became one of the earliest Chrismons because they are monograms for Christos, the Greek word for Christ. These simple monograms and some crosses decorated the first Chrismon Tree.

Over the years, Frances Spencer added other designs using signs and symbols utilized by the early Christians. As these designs increased in number, they included references to Jesus' life, ministry, and teachings. Chrismons are traditionally white, gold, and/or silver. White is the Church color for Christmas and symbolizes his Majesty and Glory.
